Rebbe Nachman of Breslov taught...

Did you ever notice that
the further people are from truth,
the more they consider someone
who turns away from evil
to be a fool?
When there is no truth in the world,
anyone who wants to turn away from evil
has no choice
but to play the fool.
(The Empty Chair, p. 74*)

What does this mean to me?

Rebbe Nachman told a parable about trying to stay spiritually sane in a crazy world—The Tainted Grain (click here to read the tale.) But the root of the idea is found in the words of the prophet Isaiah: "And the truth is absent; and he who turns from evil is considered mad..." The sages taught in the Talmud that this is just one of the symptoms of spiritual ill-health that will descend upon the world as we approach the time of Moshiach. When the world is crazy, I have no choice but to be willing to be considered foolish or mad if I refuse to follow along with the mood and opinions of the time. It requires courage to keep on the right path even when the world around me believes that I am wrong.

grant me clarity and assurance in whatever I do.

Teach me to trust in wise teachersto learn from their insightful words.
Teach me to trust in true friendsto treasure their care and concern.
Teach me to trust in myselfto judge my own course
correctly,
