Rebbe Nachman of Breslov taught...

All beginnings require that you unlock new doors.

The key is giving and doing.

Give charity and do kindness.

(The Empty Chair, p. 19*)

What does this mean to me?

Rebbe Nachman taught that giving charity is always the way to make a fresh beginning in a spiritual endeavor. The Torah tells us, 'You will surely give openly to him.' The actual words—"patoach tiftach"—mean literally, "you will open an opening." The way to make that first breakthrough is with the power of charity. If self-preservation is the most basic of instincts, then the impulse to give purely altruistically is simply unnatural. This unnatural, really supernatural, act takes the drive to selfishness and transmutes it into lovingkindness. A radical act like this catalyzes a radical response—and the breakthrough is accomplished.

And even when an opening and a beginning already exists, giving charity widens the opening even more.

A prayer:

Dear G-d, full of mercy,

Have mercy on me and open all of the gateways of holiness for me.

Help me to truly enter them soon.

Make me worthy, please, of giving a great deal of charity all the time,

You who act so charitably with all creatures.

May I merit to give to the truly needy, without being judgmental or particular.

Help me to give in exactly the way that You wantwith two hands, with all my heart.

Please open, then, all of the gates of holiness for me.
"Open up the gates of righteousness,

I will enter into them and thank You."
